## **Stop Heather Mills smashing statue of Sir Paul McCartney in fun game**

A free online game has been launched where players prevent a Heather Mills character from taking down a famous monument of Sir Paul McCartney.

The game has been created following the massive statue of the pop legend falling down during power gusts from hurricane Ike that hit Houston in Texas.

And as a result, poor Paul's face was smashed during the storm.

But a Glasgow games development firm jokingly believes ex wife Heather Mills could have something to do with the 36ft statue taking a tumble.

Texas Takedown has been launched by [T-Enterprise](#) as a sequel to its famous [MuccaChucka](#) game which saw a Heather Mills character armed with a glass of water trying to claim her £24m divorce settlement.

Using your mouse, players have to stop Heather from throwing objects at the monument by destroying them before they reach Sir Paul.

The point of the game is to prevent Heather's objects from hitting the statue. The statue will eventually fall if too many objects damage the statue.

T-Enterprise's MD Sadia Chishti said: "As our MuccaChucka game was so popular we thought we would bring Heather back to stir some more trouble for Sir Paul by introducing a light hearted sequel.

She added: "On a serious note, Hurricane Ike has caused devastation for many people and the damage to Macca's statue is also a huge disappointment for the sculptor, David Adickes.

"The game is not intended to poke fun at Heather Mills, Sir Paul or the hurricane itself, it's simply a great example of how something topical can be turned into a game."
